level preparation for the world described in Thessalonians. It trains the human mind to comfortably inhabit a lie, ensuring that when the "strong delusion" arrives, the population is already perfectly conditioned to embrace it.

Me: Delusion is not the lie itself, it is the psychology that causes one to believe the lie.
